Dear co-laborers in Christ's mission,

It is always a joy for me to write to you and report on what the Holy Spirit is doing through your generous investment in the Kingdom by means of the Latin American Doctoral Program in Theology (LADPT).

Like so many others, Jean and I are in a stay-at-home mode in Holland, Michigan. We canceled our planned trips to Amsterdam; Chiapas, Mexico; and Paraguay be-

tween April and August. This February through August will be our longest time at home without traveling that we have had in over twenty years. I am getting some writing done, and in a way our life has not changed too much, since almost all of our work with the LADPT has been via the internet. Since our doctoral program has been structured as a distance-learning, on-line system of faculty mentoring and supervision, the stay-at-home situations of our students and faculty in the various countries have not impacted our doctoral program very much.



April 7 — Dissertation defense of Christian Giordano held virtually at the Free University of Amsterdam. LACM Board of Trustees virtual meeting. June 6 — Chuck & Jean's 50th wedding anniversary, WOW June 7 — Chuck preaches at our son Andrew's graduation from the Pastor's College at Christ the Word Presbyterian Church in Toledo, Ohio. This past January 30 we had the dissertation defense of Rev. Pedro Robledo via an internet connection of 5 of us located in 4 different locations: Lima, Peru; Chiapas, Mexico; Colorado Springs; and Michigan. Pedro was one of Jean's and my students when we were missionaries in Chiapas, Mexico. After that, he went to the Presbyterian Seminary in Mexico City for his bachelor's in theology. He was then selected to be the President of the John Kempers Theological Seminary in Chiapas that Jean and I helped to start. While he led that seminary, he did a master's in theology at the

Biblical Seminary in San José, Costa Rica. Recently, he founded the "Yobel" Center for Biblical Studies in San Cristobal de Las Casas, Chiapas, my hometown. He began his doctoral studies with us in 2014. His focus has been to examine how Luke describes in Luke 1 to 15 the way the Holy Spirit changed the mind-set of the early Jewish Christians from a particularist view of God's mission as being only for the Jews to a universal perspective of God's mission for all humanity. I was Pedro's mentor and this defense was a huge milestone for him. Your prayers and financial support have made it possible for Pedro to do these doctoral studies. This coming May, Jean and I were planning to be in Chiapas for a couple of weeks. Our trip there has been postponed until perhaps next November. We look forward to seeing Pedro and his family then. Praise God with us!

On February 25 we had the joy of holding the dissertation defense of one of our LADPT students. Four professors and the candidate, located in four different countries, met together via the internet for the 2-hour defense of **Felix Abreu**. Felix lives and ministers in the Dominican

Republic. He is a pastor and also teaches in a seminary there. Felix is a psychologist, specializing in family systems. His research involved studying the life experiences of pastors' families. What factors, both positive and negative, impact pastors' families in the Dominican Republic? He interviewed over 20 pastors and their families belonging to five

different denominations. He learned so much. He told us that what was especially touching was how the pastors, their spouses, and their children hugged him and said, "Thank you, thank you for asking us about our experience! No one has ever asked us what it is like to be a pastor's family." Flowing from his research, Felix has quite a list of recommendations he will be making to the various denominational leaders. PRAISE GOD FOR DR. CHRISTIAN GIORDANO FROM SPAIN!

In spite of the coronavirus complications and restrictions, in the LAPTD we are in harvest mode! Your personal and financial investment in this endeavor is yielding fruit! On April 7, we were happy to have the dissertation defense on-line of one of our LADPT students. Ten persons from 5 countries were together via ZOOM for a 2 -hour dissertation defense. Christian Giordano, the candidate, lives in Spain. He directs a special training center for Latin American cross-cultural missionaries preparing for long-term ministry in Muslim contexts. Over 600 Protestant mission agen-

cies in Latin America send more than 9000 international, cross-cultural missionaries all over the world. Many of these new Latin

American missionaries are on their way to Muslim contexts. Christian has been pastoring a church in Spain. He and his wife, Charo, also run a small hostel for Muslim young people who end up in Spain with nowhere to live. Christian began his doctoral studies with us in 2008. He researched 12 Latin American Christian missionary development projects that sparked the emergence of local Christian churches in their contexts. He is the first to graduate from the Free University of Amsterdam, one of our partner degree-granting institutions. Please celebrate with us Christian Giordano's successful defense!
