This past February, I was in Buenos Aires, Argentina, teaching a course in the Doctor of Ministry (D. Min.) program

of the International Baptist Seminary (see photo below right). It was such a joy to be with Dr. Viviana Barron, the President of the seminary (pictured below, left). She has a Ph.D. in qualitative research from a national university in Argentina. She and her husband, Jorge, pastor a church on the outskirts of Buenos Aires. She is doing a wonderful job of leading the seminary, one of the oldest and largest evangelical seminaries in South America, with local and distance programs in church leadership, bachelor's, master's, and D. Min. studies. The bachelor's and master's programs are officially recognized and accredited by the Argentine government, a rare and prestigious status. Pastors from Uruguay, Chile, Argentina, Paraguay, and Korea were in my class.



While in Buenos Aires, I met with Viviana Barron, Norberto Saracco, and Ruben Driedger (pictured below). Ruben is one of our graduates from Paraguay. They represented three of the six institutions that form the PRODOLA NETWORK, a consortium that has taken responsibility for the future long-term leadership, direction, and support of the Latin American Doctoral Program. You will remember that we wrote you about that last September.





We are hoping and praying to begin a new group of doctoral students this coming August. This new 2018 group would meet in Buenos Aires, hosted by Viviana and the International Baptist Seminary. We need your prayers. The leaders of churches, mission agencies, and seminaries throughout Latin America are all experiencing a deep financial crisis that makes Ph.D.-level theological studies difficult. We are praying that ten to twelve leaders will each be able to cover their travel and initial tuition costs in order to begin their studies. Please pray with us. This is your ministry. You have walked with us through this adventure. You have prayed, supported, and encouraged us. Join us in prayer and rejoicing.

Spotlight on Student Needs (We will highlight a different student in each newsletter for your prayers and special gifts.) Graciela Santa Cruz (pictured at left with Chuck) is a psychologist, pastor, Bible school professor and mobilizer in missions in the Church of God in Argentina. She has extensive experience as a pastor and psychologist working with children, youth, women and men in public health and in the prisons in Buenos Aires. She plans to research the psychological, social, and spiritual perspectives of abandoned women in the prison system of Buenos Aires, to learn how the church can better reach out and serve them. Graciela has completed the first half of her doctoral program and is now ready for the research and dissertation-writing phase. She needs our help. Her personal salary barely makes ends meet. She needs \$7,000 dollars to pay for her tuition in order to continue in the doctoral program. Her research is very important for the ministry and mission of the church in Latin America. PRAISE GOD FOR ANOTHER RECENT GRADUATE

Dr. Rafael Vallejo defended his dissertation last December and in April graduated (long-distance) from the South African Theological Seminary (SATS), one of our partners. Rafael's first language is Tagalog, his second is English, and his third is Spanish.

Rafael began his faith journey in the Philippines as a young boy, entering seminary at 13 and at 18 taking evangelical vows of poverty, chastity and obedience in a missionary congregation in Manila. He left the order in 1974 to pursue a degree in Philosophy and a career in International Business. He migrated to Canada in 1995. "I started out in Canada mopping floors at a local 7-Eleven in downtown Vancouver," Rafael tells us. "From there I became Food Service Director at Simon Fraser University. Back then when people asked me what I did for a living I said I fed 5000 kids every day. It was only later when I reflected on my own migrant experience that I became involved in on-the-ground advocacy for migrant justice."

After a career in food service, Rafael, a chef by trade, was accepted by San Francisco Theological Seminary (PC-USA) under care of the Filipino Community Presbyterian Church in Eagle Rock, California. Rafael studied at the Graduate Theological Union (GTU) in Berkeley while working as a chef in a nearby Mediterranean restaurant. Rafael continued his Masters in Theological Studies at Conrad Grebel College at the University of Waterloo. He completed his Master's of Divinity at Knox College, Toronto School of Theology, University of Toronto in May 2011. In Sept 2012, Columbia Theological Seminary in Atlanta, Georgia awarded him the Reformed Theology Guthrie Scholar Award for Reformed Theology. Rafael served as Minister and Teaching Elder with two churches with Hispanic ministries in downtown Toronto. He is the first Filipino Hispanic person that the Presbyterian Church in Canada has ordained as Minister of Word and Sacrament in Ontario.

Using a social-science approach called "Lived Religion," Rafael explored faith perspectives and practices of Mexican Migrant Farmworkers in Canada from April to November under the Seasonal Agricultural Workers Program (SAWP). Approximately 20,000 migrant workers work in fields, orchards and greenhouses in Canada every year. Rafael listened as Mexican migrant workers described their faith journeys in their own words. Responses were coded and clustered into five themes: 1. Ia salud (Health) 2. Ia familia (Family) 3. Ia fe (Faith) 4. Ias remesas (Money sent back home) and 5. Ia lucha (Struggle).



Rafael suggests that religion is a dominant factor in migrant ways of believing, belonging, sense of purpose, health, and social cohesion. Based on his research, Rafael offers a number of important recommendations for the church's ministry among and with migrant workers and recent immigrants.
